Sand storm!

In this autumnal edition of *Shouldham News*, we devote much space to a topic that is currently causing great concern in the villages of Shouldham and Marham: the proposed development of a silica sand-extraction site within the bounds of our parishes. A campaign group against the development has already been formed and we publish below a slightly shortened version of the group's press release. Hundreds of locals oppose proposed Silica Sand Quarry

Press release from 'Campaigners Against Two Silica Sites'

If you haven't heard already, you will now. Carved into the beautiful landscape between Shouldham and Marham, running parallel to Spring Lane, could become the destination for the *largest* Silica Sand extraction Quarry in Norfolk (SIL 02), making the quarry in Leziate look like a child's sandpit.

Many of you (including Marham and Shouldham Parish Councils) have sent comments and objection letters, concerned emails and various complaints to Norfolk County Council and to MPs. Meetings have happened and new meetings are planned (please see below for key dates). But there are still many, many questions that need answers. Which is why hundreds of locals in Marham and Shouldham have formed an independent action group to fight this proposed quarry. The group is known as 'CATSs' standing for 'Campaigners Against Two Silica Sites' in Shouldham and Marham.

Yes folks, that's right. There's another site we need to protect. Because, while all eyes will be on developments for the '*preferred*' Sibelco site (SIL 02), we cannot take our eyes off the other potential 'Area of Search' site that Sibelco is also interested in. Shouldham Warren is also under threat, listed as one of the 41 sites on the 'Proposed Mineral Extraction Sites' document. It is imperative we not only object to Shouldham / Marham (SIL 02) site but also campaign to have the 'Area of Search' site in Shouldham Warren (AoS E) removed from the list, as campaigners so successfully achieved at a proposed silica site in Dersingham two years ago.

Key facts - (SIL 02) preferred site

- Size: The 390.36 hectare site is within the parishes of Marham and Shouldham
- The estimated silica sand resource in the site is 16,000,000 tonnes
- The proposer of the site has given a potential start date of 2027 and estimated the extraction rate to be 800,000 to 900,000 tonnes per annum.

Based on this information, the full mineral resource at the site could be extracted within 20 years. Therefore, 9,000,000 tonnes could be extracted within the plan period.

Parish Council public meetings

- Marham Parish Council meeting: a proposed silica sand extraction meeting to include Sibelco representative Mr Mike Hurley and County Councillor Graham Middleton. Held October 3rd.
- Marham Parish Council meeting held on Friday, 12th October: surgery with Miss Elizabeth Truss MP for South West Norfolk and Chief Secretary to the Treasury, to discuss the proposed silica sand extraction plans.

Forthcoming key decision dates

- Norfolk County Council will publish the feedback on initial consultation this autumn
- The Preferred Options Consultation starts in February 2019; this is a critical key date
- Then follows the Secretary of State approvals, after which Sibelco can apply for planning permission.

Norfolk minerals and waste local plan review – initial consultation

The Parish Council have objected to the possible proposed extraction of silica sand from a site between Shouldham and Marham based on the reasons put forward by Shouldham residents at an Extra-Ordinary meeting of the Shouldham Parish Council held on 6 August 2018. This Initial Consultation response reflected the public representations made at the meeting, together with the views of the Parish Councillors.

A plea to car parkers

Ann Hullah wrote this article before the notice published by Lynx Buses, which follows below

I am pleading with those living along Westgate Street who park on the road – or have workmen who park on the road – to take a few moments to ensure that the Lynx bus can get through. I have been on the 39 bus twice in the last week, and on both occasions have had to watch the bus driver as he tried to get past vehicles without damaging their wing mirrors. Cars park opposite each other and, to be perfectly honest, the drivers don't seem to care.

Just think if an ambulance or paramedic was trying to get to you and was impeded by parked vehicles; you wouldn't find it funny. If this parking continues it's only a matter of time before Lynx withdraws its services to Westgate Street. I know of a woman in her 90s who goes shopping and has her hair done weekly, and who could not walk to the Green to catch the bus, or walk home again with shopping. One day you may not be able to drive a car, and will need to rely on a bus; but it won't be there – just because of people's thoughtlessness when parking.

Update from Lynx Buses: beginning Sunday 28th October

Service 39 – It is regrettable but this service will no longer be serving the Eastgate or Westgate Street loop in Shouldham village itself. The bus will instead stop opposite and adjacent to The King's Arms on Lynn Road. This change is necessary due to the sheer volume of planned and unplanned road closures on this section of route, mainly to connect individual properties to utilities. Additionally we continually face issues of the road being blocked by inconsiderately parked cars, removal vehicles and oil delivery which cause the service to be delayed. As a result of this change of route there are minor changes to times. The last bus from King's Lynn will depart 10 minutes later (5.35pm) as a result of customer feedback.

Using SMS to contact the 999 service in an emergency

The following information was supplied by Claire Atterbury who notes: 'I thought this might be of interest to fellow Shouldham residents. Sometimes there is only enough signal [here] to text not phone.'

Many people on the autism spectrum find talking on the phone difficult and prefer to communicate via email, text or social media. But what if you needed to call 999 in an emergency?

EmergencySMS is a free service that allows you to use SMS (text messaging) to contact any of the UK 999 services (police, ambulance, fire and rescue or coast-guard). It's available for anyone who finds making a voice call difficult, including members of the autistic community. To use the service, you need to pre-register your phone on the website – we recommend you *do it now* so it's ready to use when you need it.

From July 1st 2018, our Lily service expanded to include everyone over 18, not just those in later years.

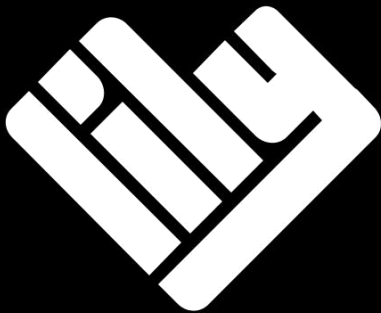
